




The St. Edward shield is rich in symbolism and tradition. This seal signifies the ideals and philosophy of St. Edward.

The wavy lines at the bottom signify Lake Erie, on whose shores St. Edward lies. In the upper left-corner of the emblem is the classic book with the word VERITAS. This represents St. Edwards academic aims. The dove-topped sceptor of Saint Edward the Confessor symbolizes the patron saint of the school. This school is also named after Bishop Edward F. Hoban. The dove expresses the inspiration and guidance of the Holy Spirit in all of the school's endeavors. The Anchor of Hope emphasizes the development and formation of Christian Hope. The Cross is superimposed over the whole shield.

This shows the significance of the shield of St. Edward High School, a school dedicated to the education of Catholic young men by the brothers of Holy Cross and the dedicated Christian teachers.

The small shield that follows each article symbolizes what St. Edward stands for. Spirit, a sense of pride in everything we do and how we do them ...





It was Jim East's turn to snatch the microphone. We all "hidee-hidee-hoed" as Jim told us the story 'bout Minnie the Moocher!



It was quite an action-packed evening. Eventually everyone left with smiles, hoping that the party would be as good as the dance.





So, you can see that life at St. Edward is never very dull. Sometimes it is "routine" but never very dull.














Spirit Flys High






"After Hours"



No matter what the hobby, flying model air planes or deep sea diving, there is probably someone at St. Ed's doing it. W








"Encore! Encore!"















Team opened the season in the usual position as one of the area's finest teams. The senior class of 1982 led a high-spirited squad into a tough schedule.

In the first game they played against the Strongsville Mustangs in Strongsville. St. Eds battled in the mud and rain with the stubborn upset-minded Mustang team. Frank Waite scored the only touchdown of the night as the Eagles came away with a 7-0 victory.

The home opener at Finnie stadium the following week brought the Trojans of Findlay to town. The offense finally opened up as the gridders achieved victory number two 29-6.

The third game was home against the pathetic busing-stricken East High School. St. Eds rolled over the Blue Bombers 35-0.

In week number 4, our Eagles made a trip to the Glass Bowl at the University of Toledo to face St. Francis. Our powerful defense rose to the occasion holding the Knights scoreless. The offense racked-up 21 points and the gridders came away with a 4-0 record, and a fourth place state ranking.


On the next Saturday night, St. Edward headed for Mentor to face the Cougars of Lake Catholic. Everyone had revenge on their minds. Who could forget the 16-15 loss on homecoming day last year. Although Lake scored first, St. Eds wasn't about to ruin another perfect record. The Eagles fought back and Bill Kahl ran it in in the middle of the fourth quarter to ice the fifth straight victory 15-7.

Homecoming 1981 saw the Bruins of Padua invading.Our defense stagnated a lack-luster Bruin offense and Padua became the sixth victim and the fourth shut-out 20-0.

The high-light of the season came on October 17th when the Wildcats












The next outing was in New York, were the Eagles defeated teams from three states to take the Clayton Benard Memorial Tournament.


After taking our President's Day Tournament, St. Edward closed out the season with a 7th Sectional, 6th District, and 5th State Tournament Championship.






Greg Elinsky receives his honors after winning the state championship.













It's All In The Wrist








Second year coach Gary Gruss heads the JV's.

The Rally Committee had a very successful and interesting year. This commit-


tee had the difficult task of pleasing both the students and the administration.

Raiders of the Lost Ark was the theme of the first rally which proved to be the best in years.







The dance itself was sold out.




importantly, he has changed spiritually.

It seems that the same faculty members are always there. They want all students to feel included in the community. Time and again they sacrifice their days and weekends for retreat.


The spiritual growth that can be accomplished through these retreats is priceless. God has truly blessed us by bringing this program to St. Edward High School.










