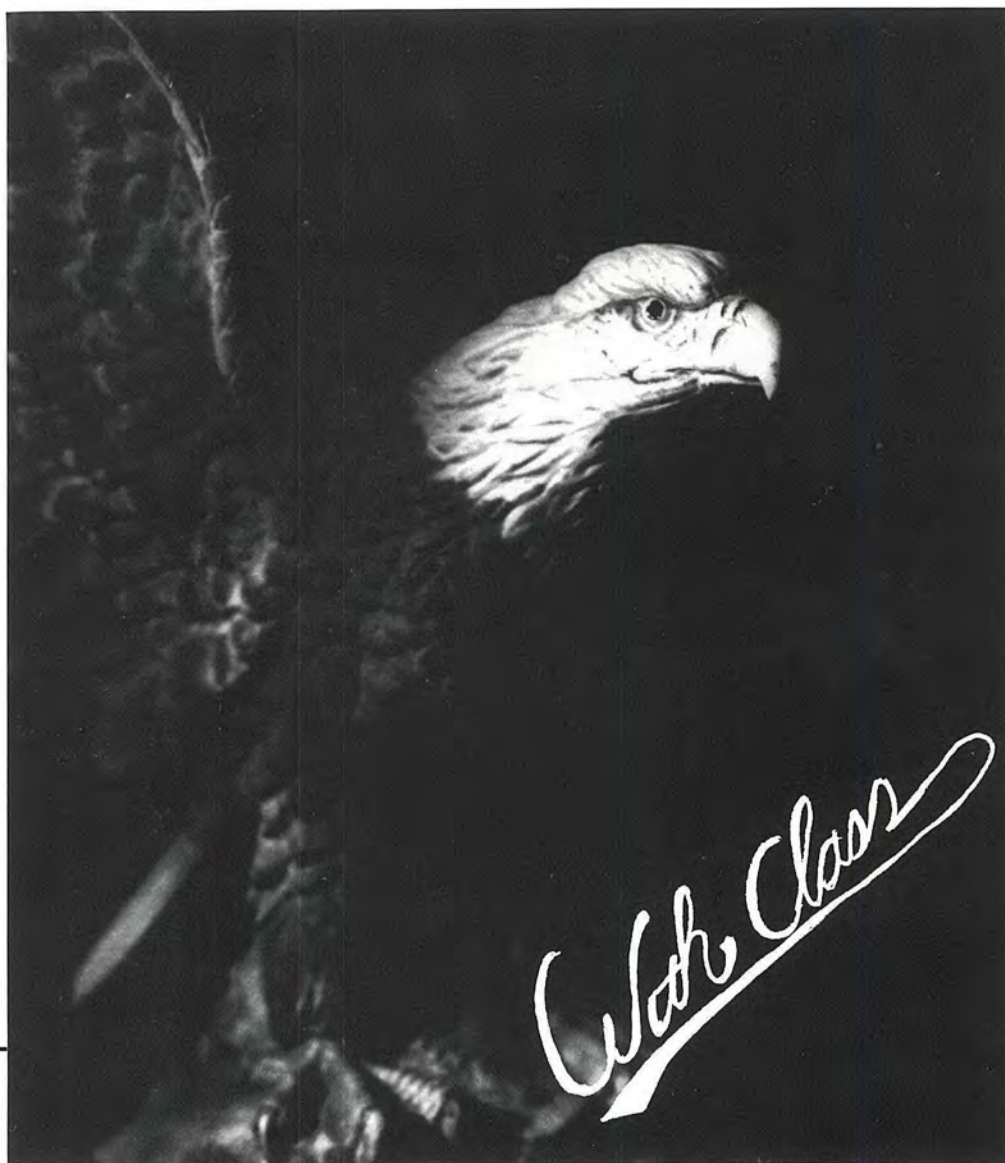

The most affluent people claim to have class when actu-

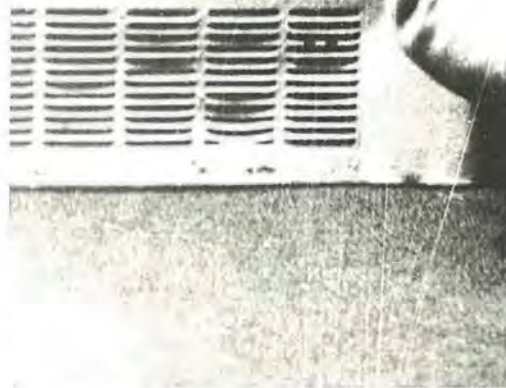
ally the smallest herb at St. Ed's has it oozing out of his pores.

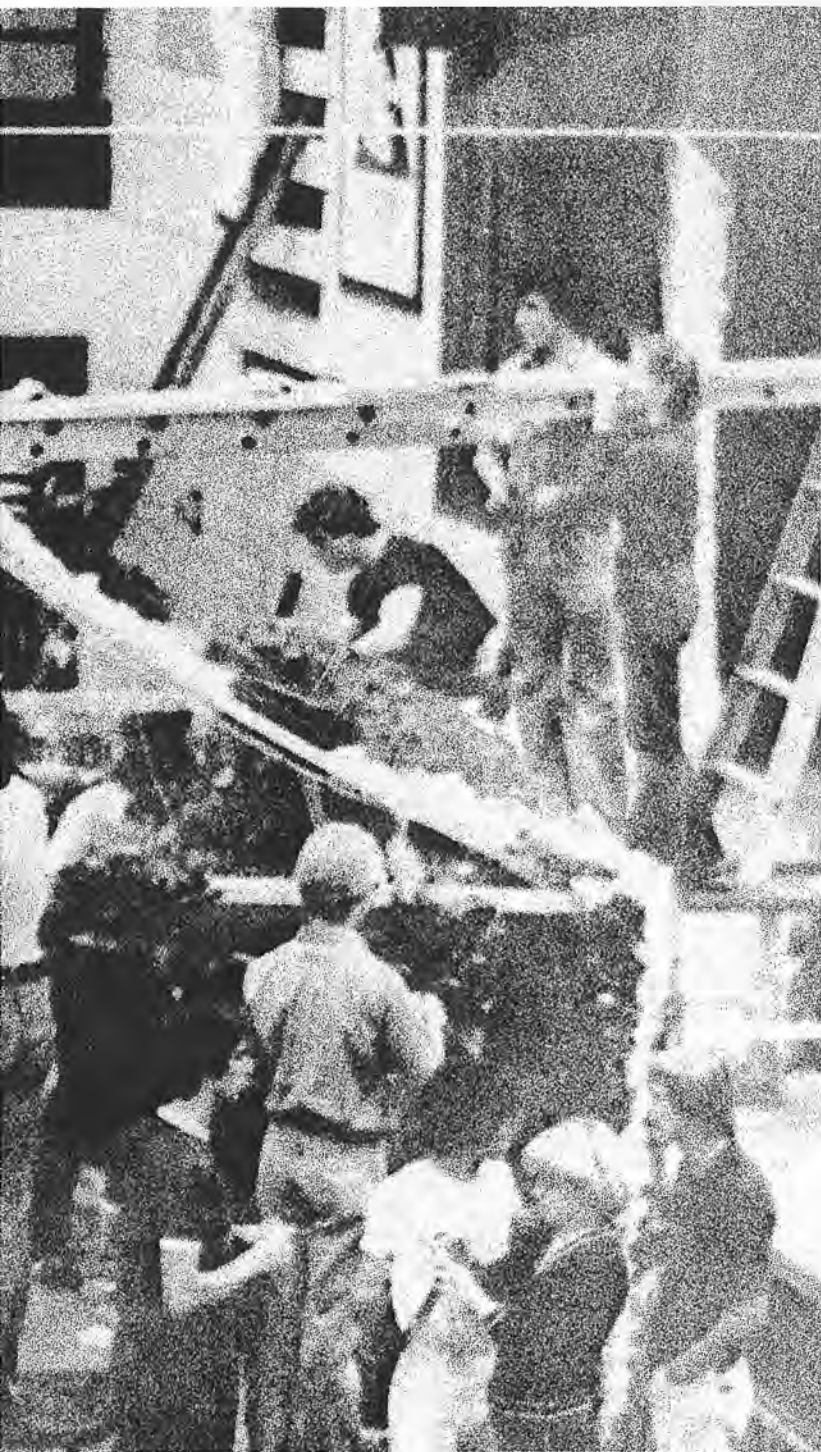

We end our tour with the Library and The Research Center, two well-equipped centers of learning. Students use these centers for **quiet** study and special projects.

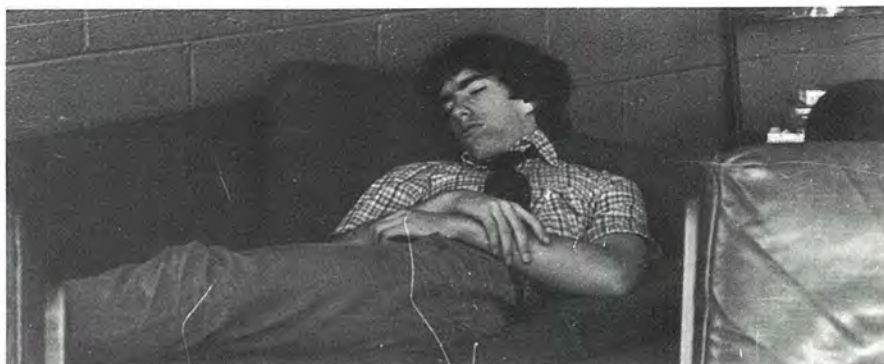

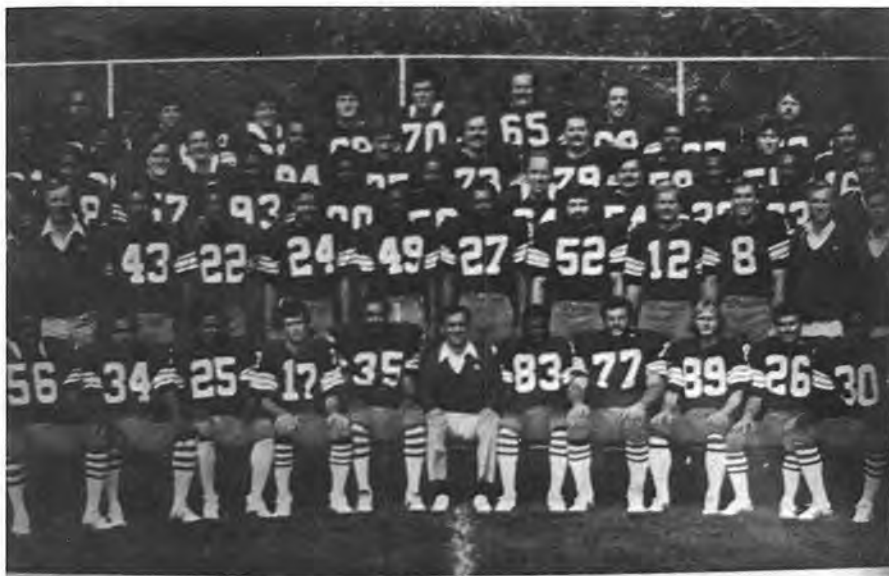

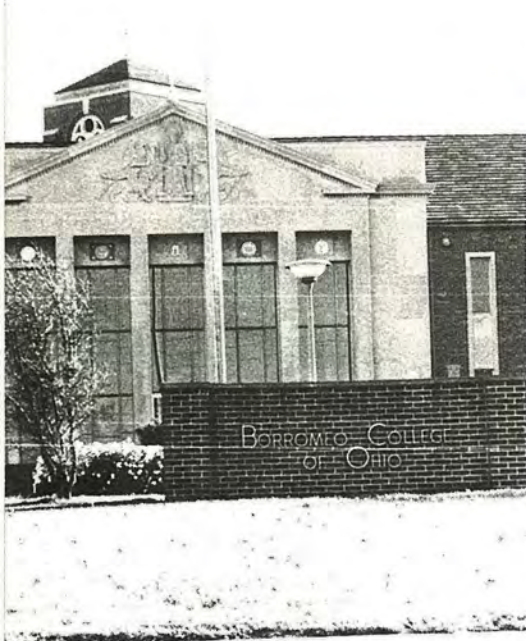

When the snow begins to melt in



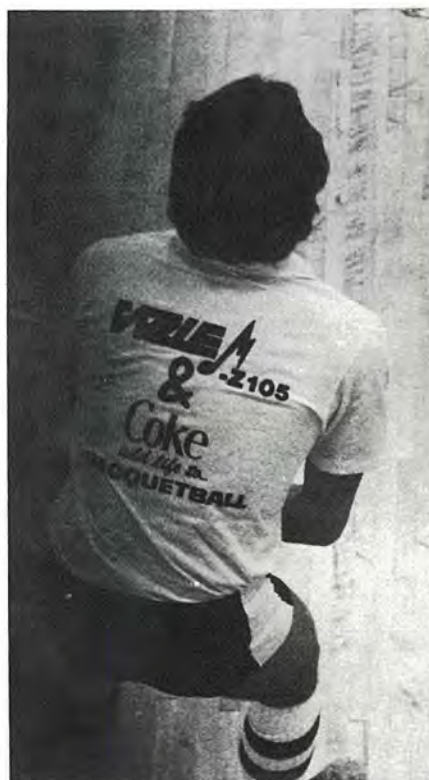
Senior Mark Brandt gets into the swing of things.

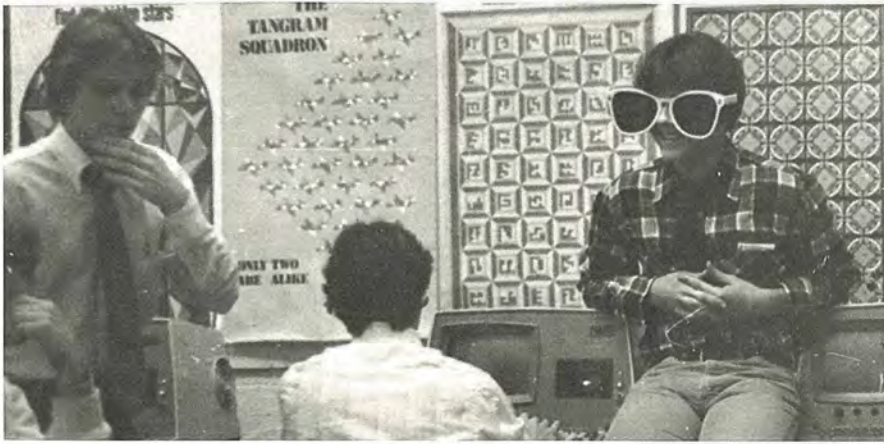

MR. LAWRENCE CODY
A PERSONAL REMEMBRANCE

Mr. Lawrence Cody taught Sophomore English at St. Edward for sixteen years before his death from cancer in December, 1980. Besides his classroom duties, he was moderator of Award Night, a member of the Faculty Advisory Board and a founder of the ski club. Mr. Cody handled the class speech contests for the English Department, and in the past couple of years he had become deeply committed to the retreat program.

A graduate of St. Joseph High School, Mr. Cody took degrees from John Carroll and Cleveland State Universities and served as an Army officer. He was a member of the parish council of his church. He leaves a wife and four sons.

I do not know whether any more can be said about a man than that by his example he taught others how to live. Since Mr. Cody's funeral, a number of my colleagues have told me that his death has changed their lives — as it has changed mine. I think Mr. Cody would be surprised, and a little embarrassed, at this. He was thoroughly unpretentious, the last person to put on a mantle of sanctity or tell others how to live. If he could speak to us today, I wouldn't expect any high-flown sentiments; he would probably joke about having eight priests say his funeral mass. That would be typical. Mr. Cody was the best natured person I ever knew. We at St. Ed's had come to rely on his daily good humor and good sense. If we had a joke, we could count on his laughter; if we had a problem, we could count on his understanding; in an issue before the Faculty Advisory Board, we could count on his calm judgement. Dedication to his students, devotion to his family, a great joy in living — many of us would have said these things about Mr. Cody while he was alive.

But it was only recently that I perceived the bright light of faith that burned in Mr. Cody. He had always been quietly devout, a decent and moral man. But about a year ago he discovered he had glaucoma, a serious eye disease that can cause blindness. There was no panic, no depression; he jested about it, and accepted without complaint the measures he would have to take for the rest of his life to preserve his eyesight. Would I have been as brave, I wondered? Here, clearly, was a man who had his life in better order than most of us, who had his priorities straight.

How much clearer that became this past autumn. When Mr. Cody entered the hospital for tests in October, all we knew was that he had a persistent cough. As we learned that he had cancer, and, finally, that it was terminal, we were shocked and deeply saddened. We didn't quite know what to say to him. Mr. Cody put us at ease. When we spoke to him he was uniformly cheerful, more concerned for us than for himself. As the end approached, the priest told us at the funeral, Mr. Cody more than accepted God's will, he rejoiced in it. We



would not, if we really care for Mr. Cody, ask God to let him return to us, the young priest said. We could see that his family, who missed him so much, courageously agreed. He had passed his torch of faith on to them; they are absolutely convinced that their husband and father awaits them in a better world than this.

May we learn as well as Mr. Cody did the joy and meaning that God's love can bring to our lives.

Brother Gilbert Scher, who made his religious commitment at the age of twenty-one, died at the University of Notre Dame this year over our Thanksgiving vacation.

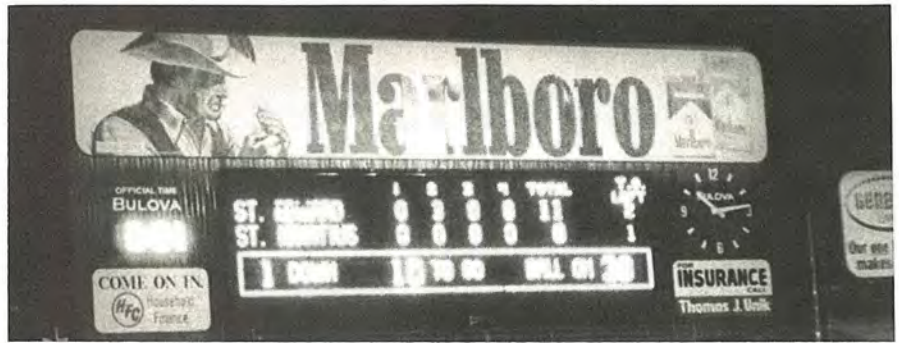

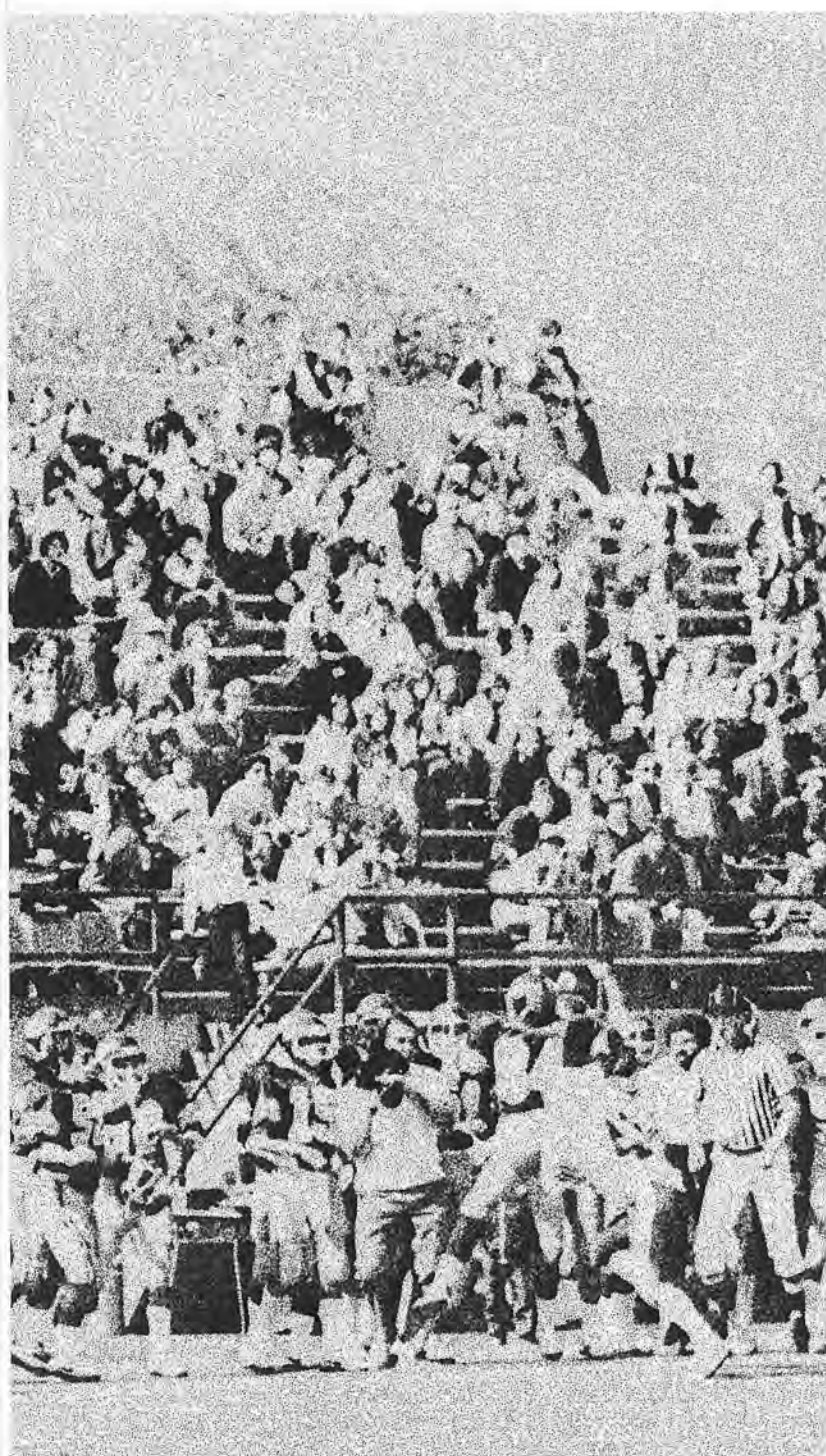

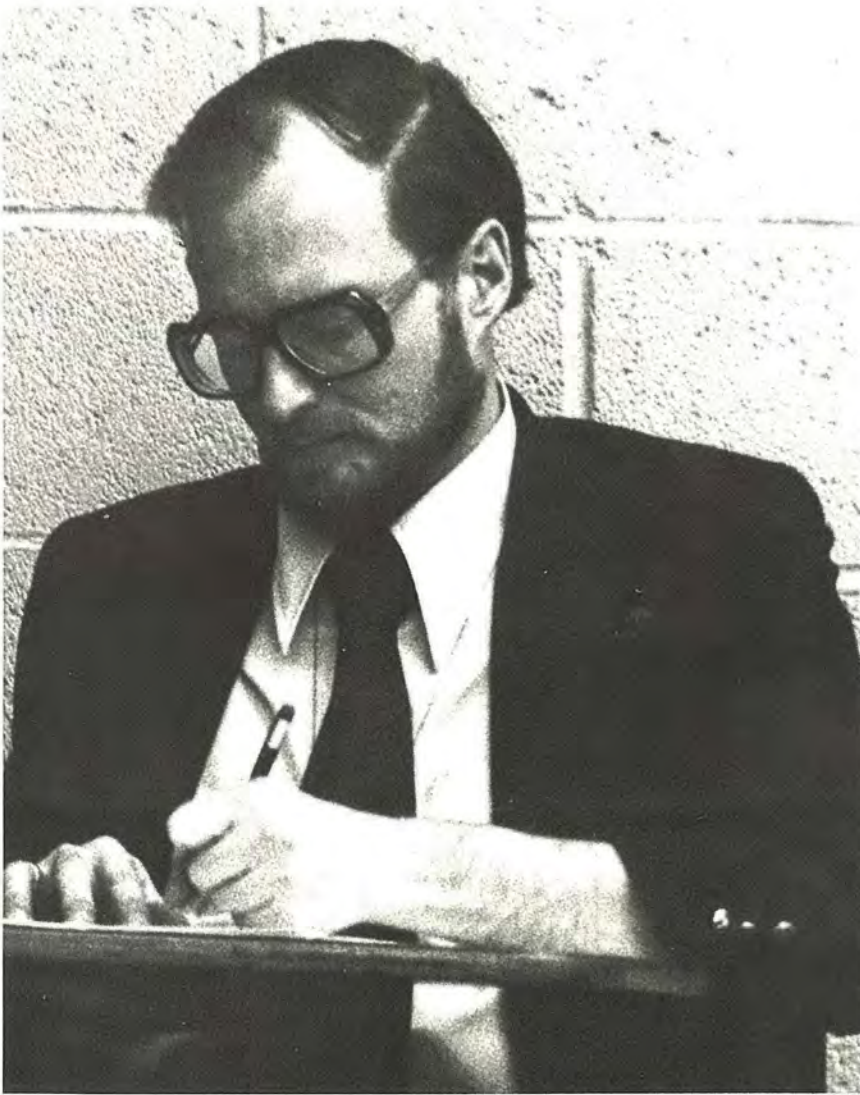

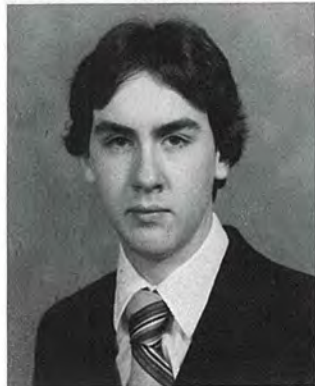
its full potential.

Our math department at St. Edward is composed of several dedicated personnel who seek to instill basic mathematical concepts in the minds of the students so that they can build on this solid foundation. Mr. Gary Hitsman commented on the department. "I believe the direction of the math program is an emphasis on the basis of math — not the cosmetic value or glory — but emphasis on detail and basic skills. Material in the upper courses is the foundation of higher math studied in college." Mr. Hitsman also commented on the future of the department. "We have not given enough homework. As a result, the students have not been challenged as much as they should. For these reasons, I favor an hour-long class for upper levels of math. This would provide the necessary time for us to accomplish what we want to."

The science department, with only five instructors, seems to be somewhat understaffed for the goals it seeks to accomplish. However, the quality of its members makes up for the deficiency in number. Bro. David

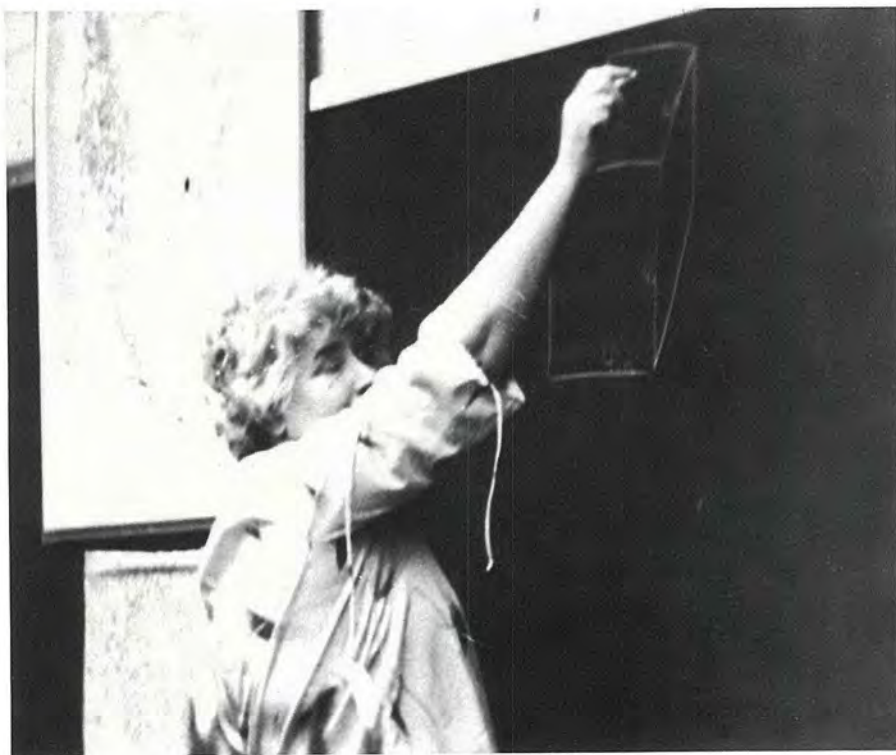
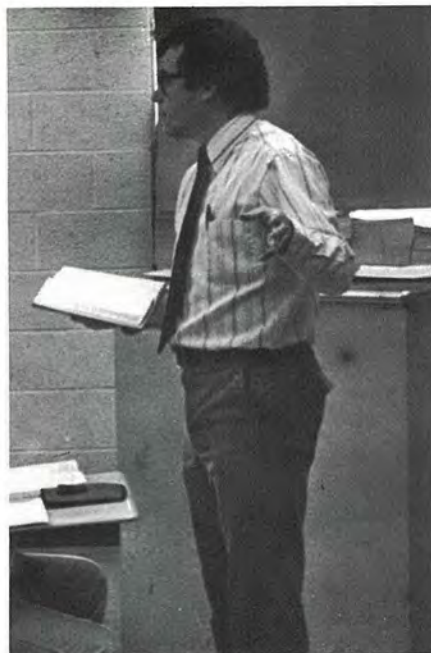
Martin commented on the state of the department. Academically, four years of science gives a broad exposure to scientific concepts which prepare the student for higher levels of science in college. I encourage students to take four years of science, and I feel that each student should be required to take at least two. We want to restore the Chemical Analysis class, also. As for personnel, they have much potential, much knowledge, and fine qualifications.

When asked to relate the science and math departments, Brother David said, "Dropping the math requirement to two years made the science classes a lot harder for students. Physics, or any science, is directly correlated to math. Fourth year math should be taken if students take physics, as well as third year math for chemistry. The study of logs makes the concept of pH in chemistry much easier to comprehend, and trigonometry is very important to the study of concurrent forces in physics."

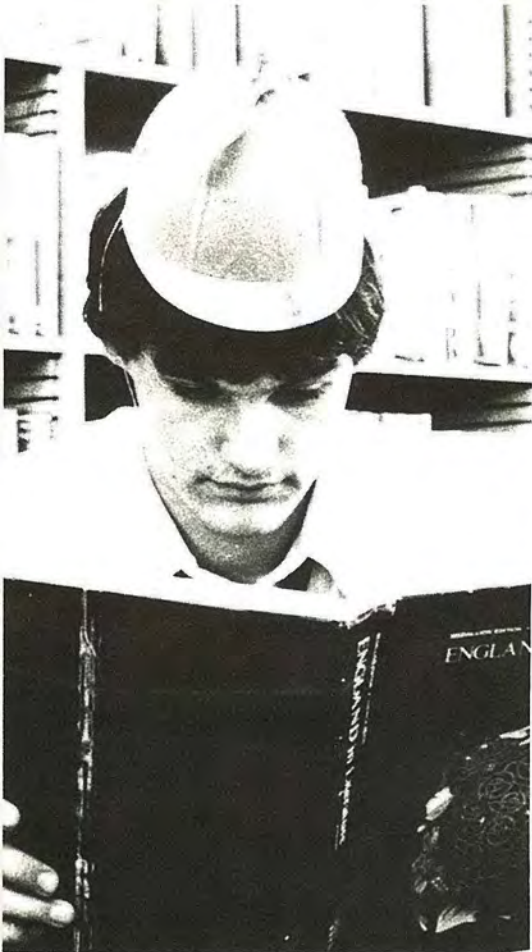

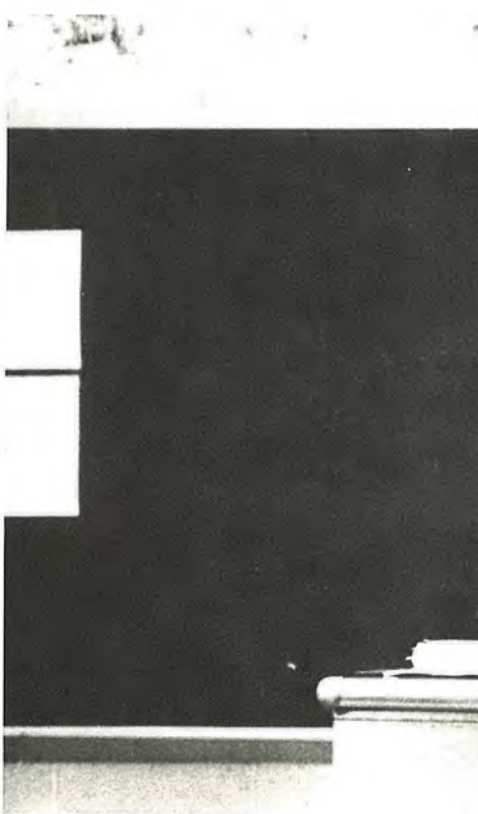

Language Departments

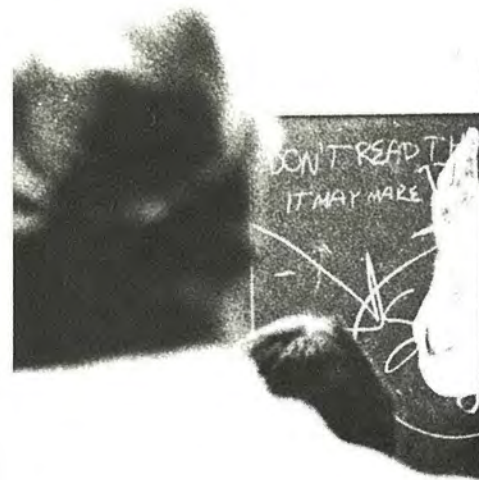

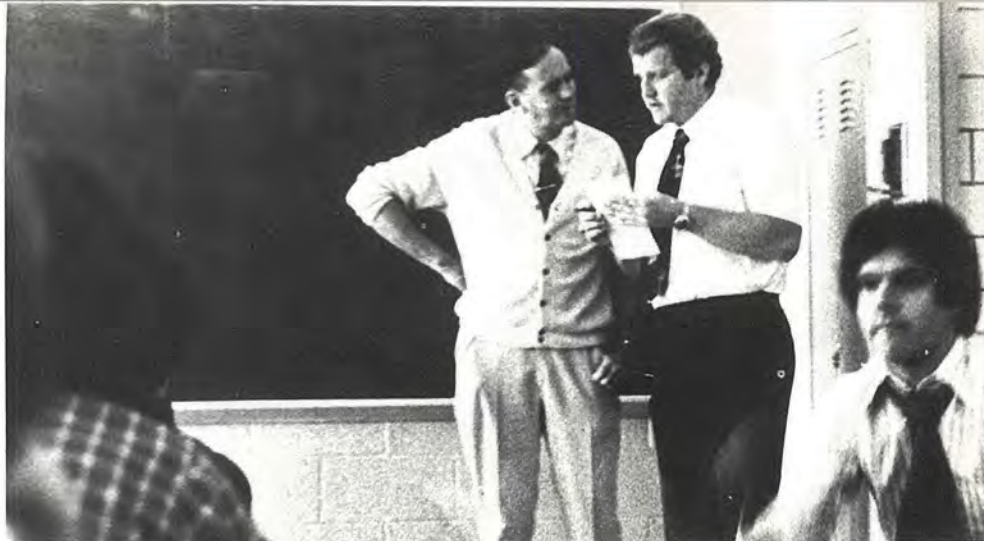

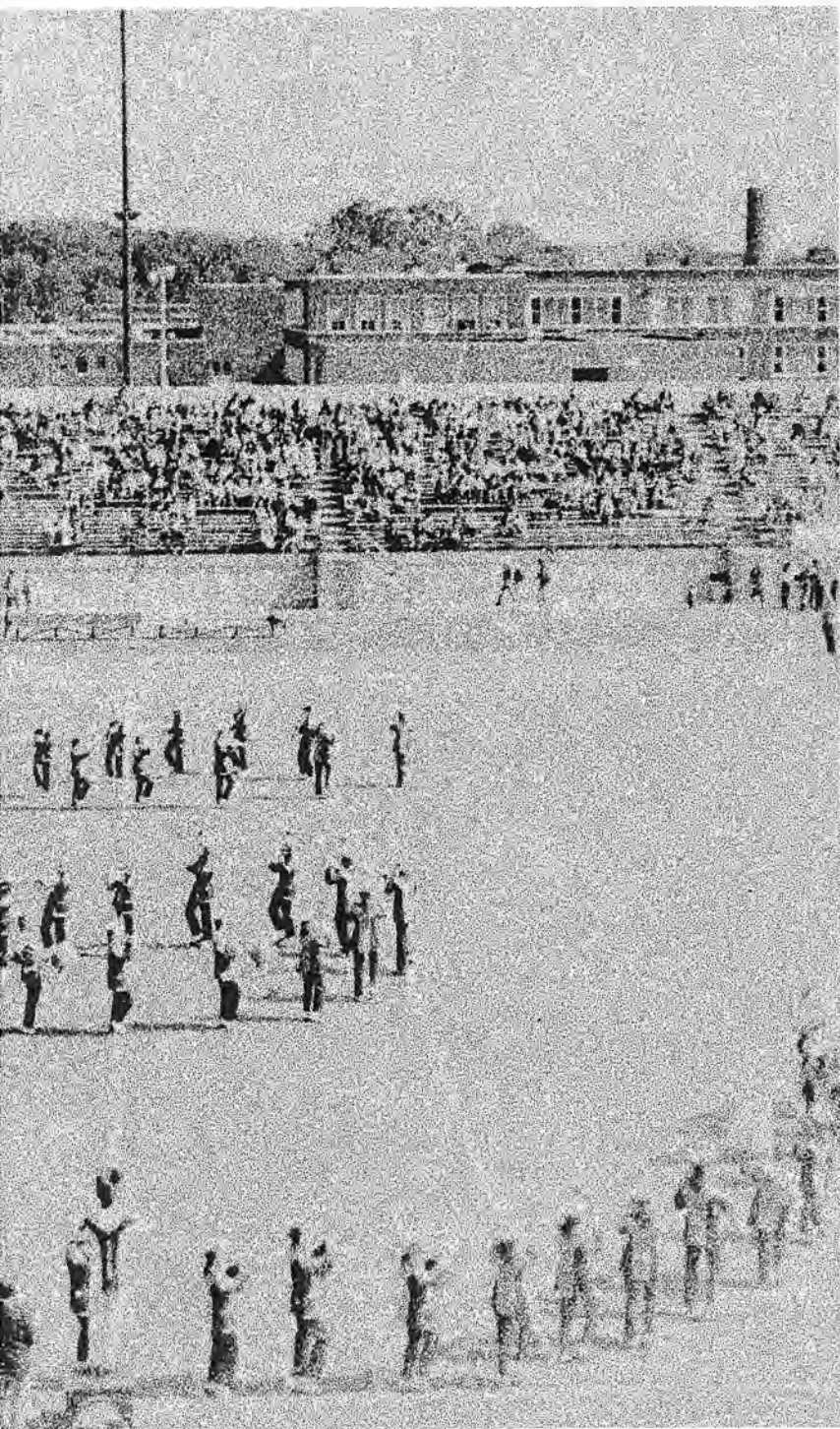

All in all, the year has been very promising and a lot of progress has been made with upper and under classmen alike.

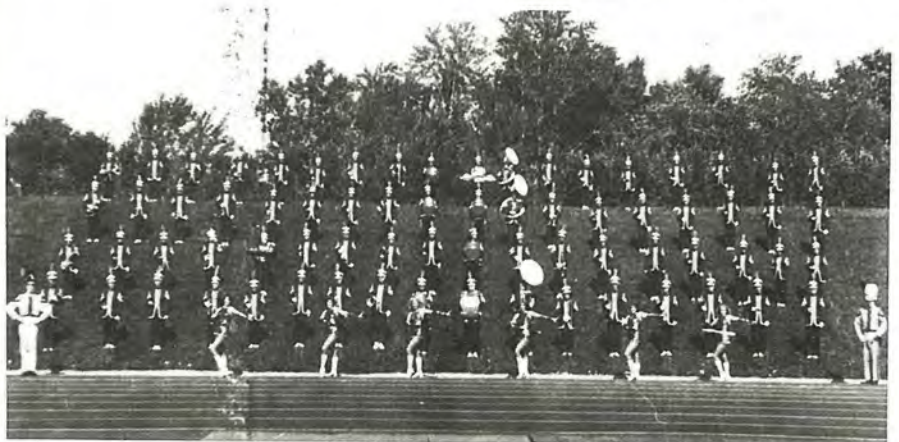

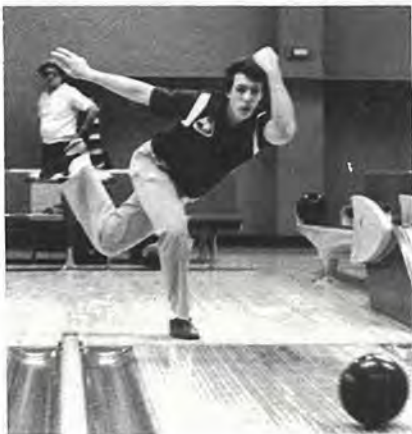

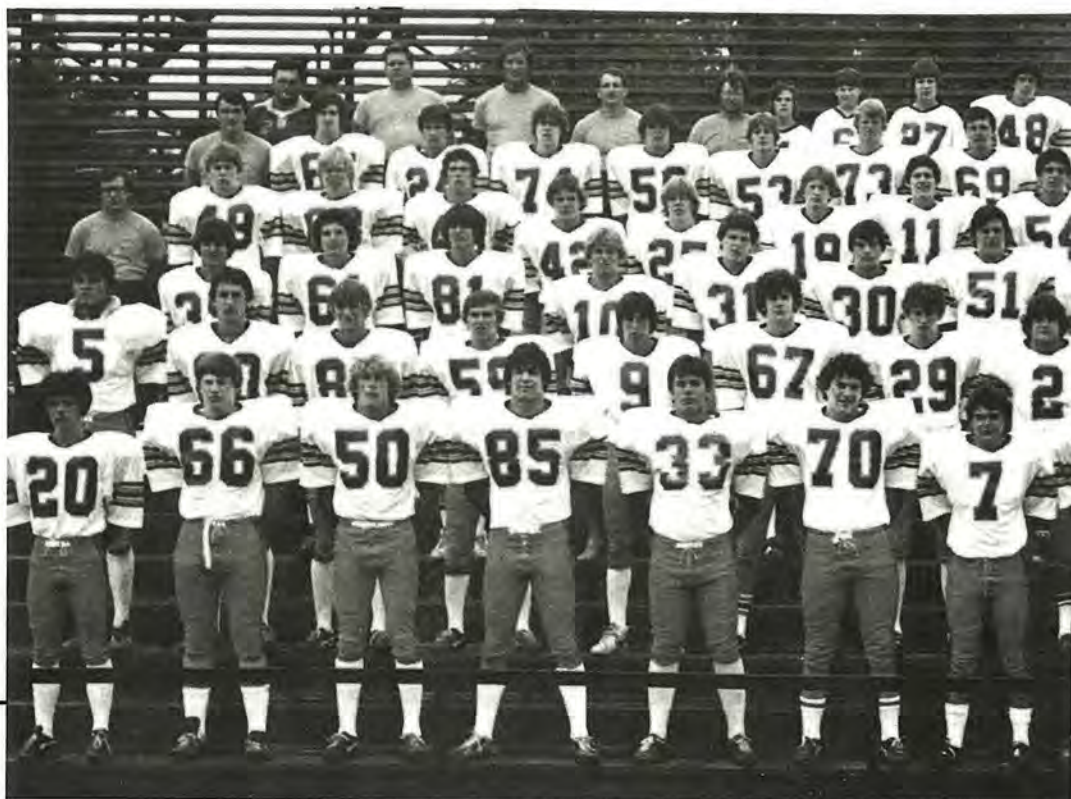
Eagles Fall Short, Fine 8-2 Season

Week three promised to be exciting as the Eagles flew from the home nest once again to face Lima Shawnee who had its best team in ten years.

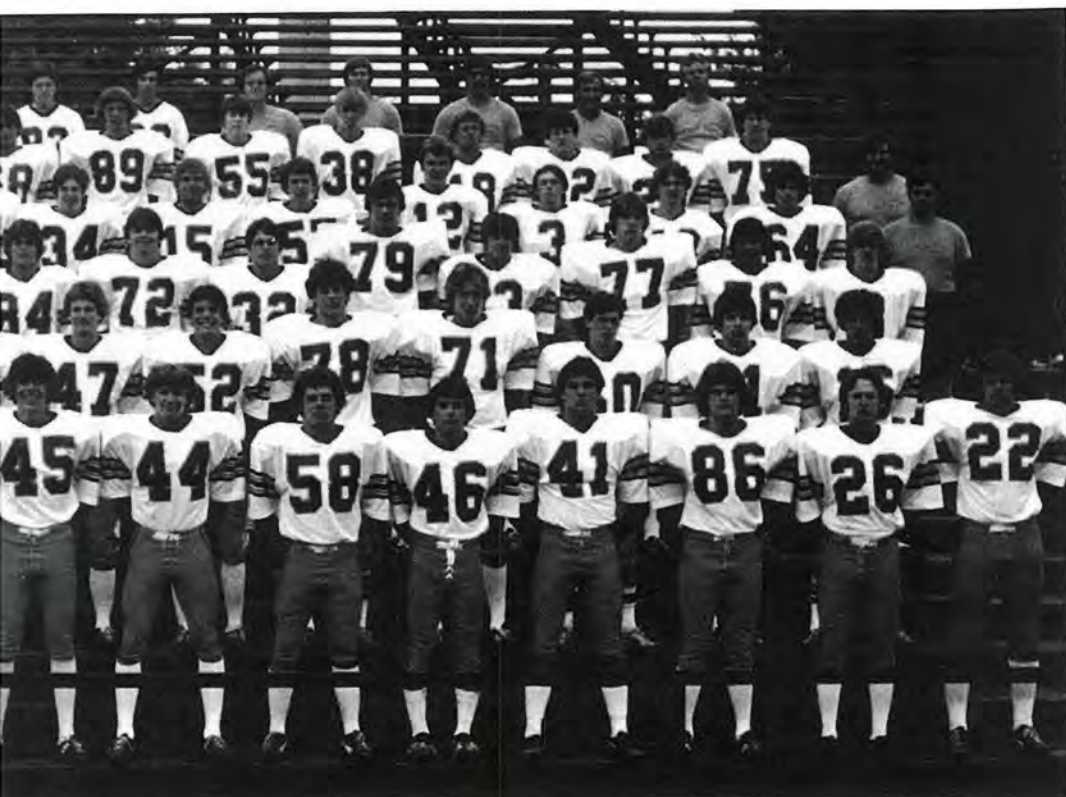

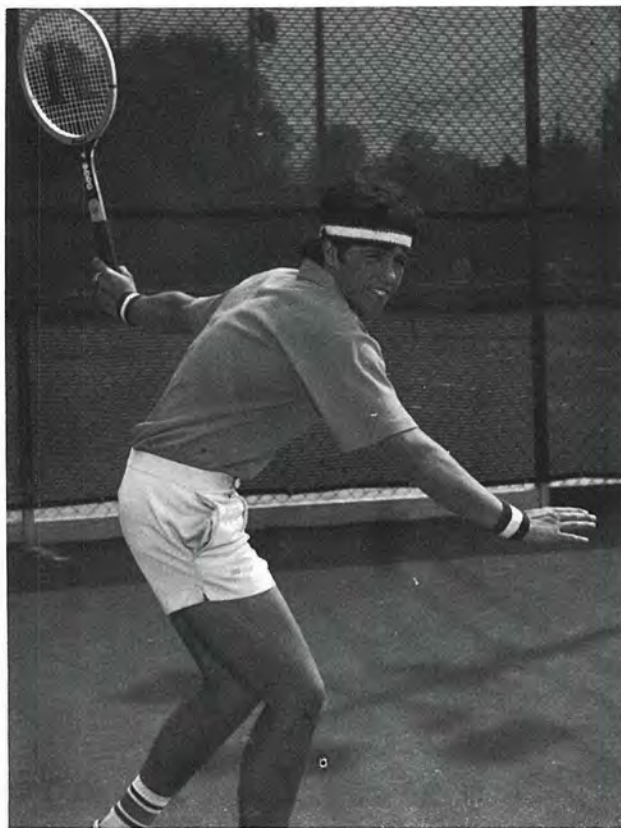

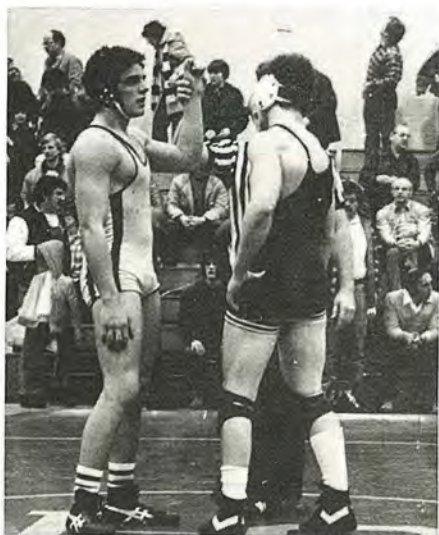


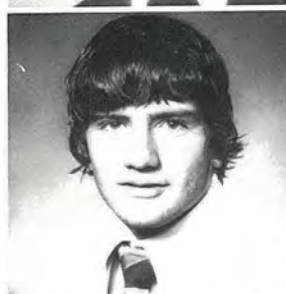
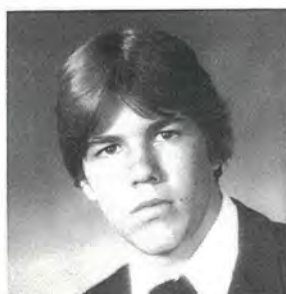
Wrestlers Go Four It!

Revenge!! That was the St. Edward Big Green Wrestling Machine's battle cry for the second half of the 1980-81 season.

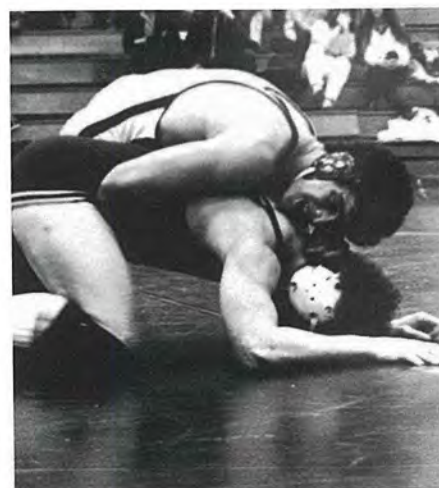

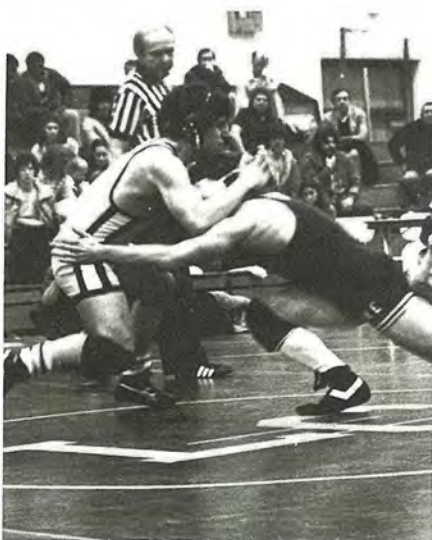

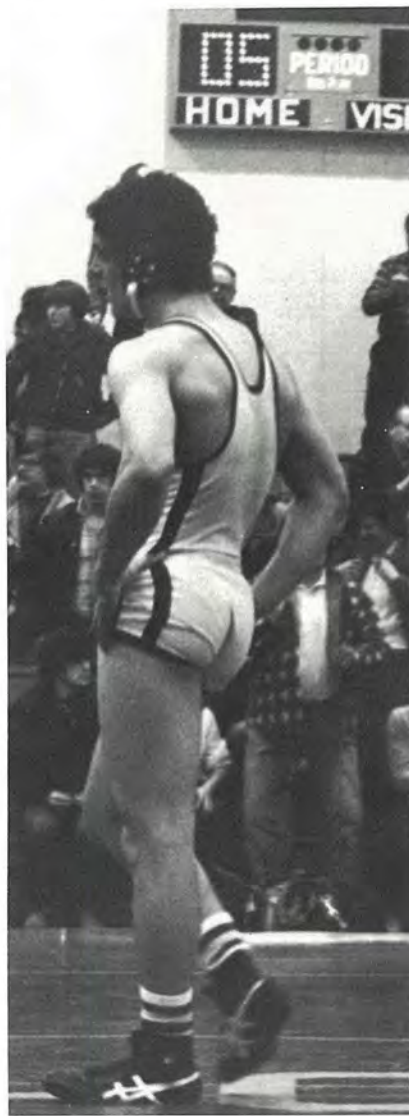
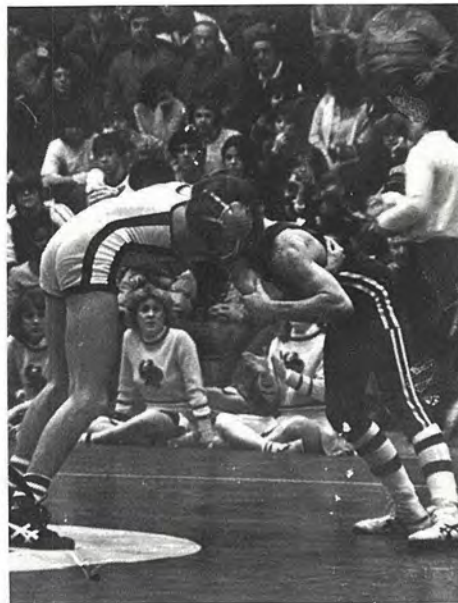


Junior John Cvetic awaits the start of the third period during the Lake Catholic dual meet.



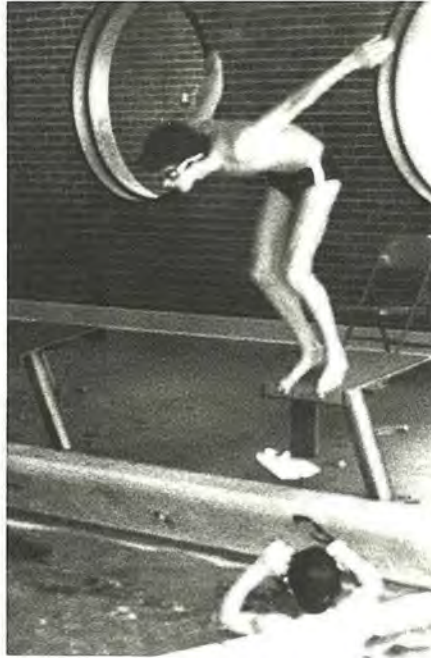


Senior Pat McCarthy concentrates on making his first move to escape from a St. Joe's grappler in the championship round of the CIT at Lake Catholic.

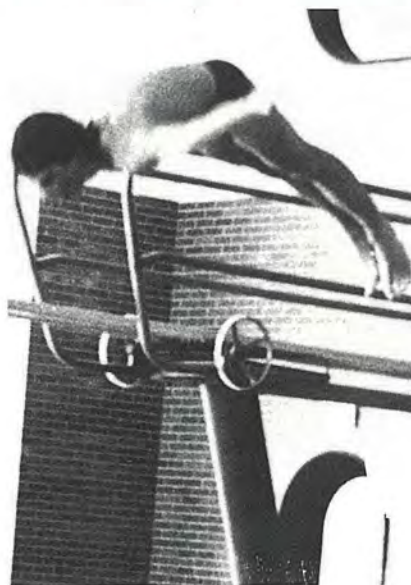

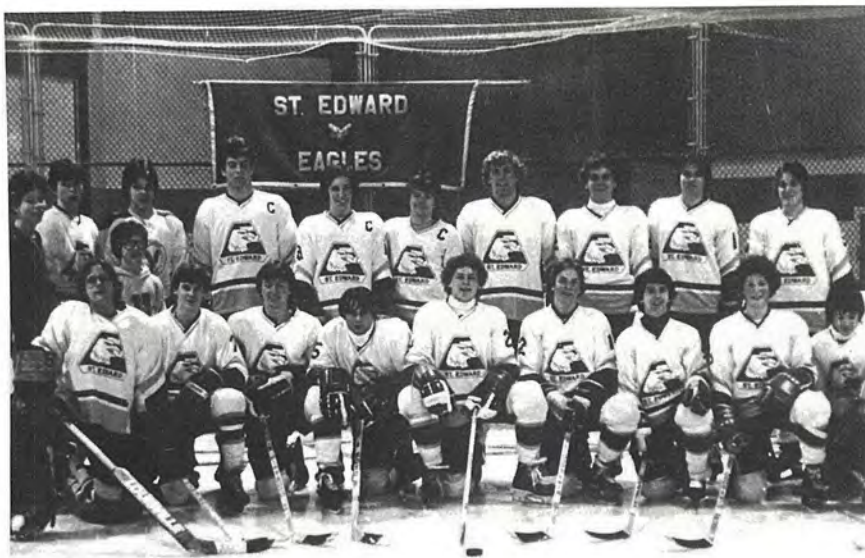

With much practice and determination plus the experienced coaching of Jerry Gruss and Pete Ducic, this team should win many games and have a good shot in the state tournament.

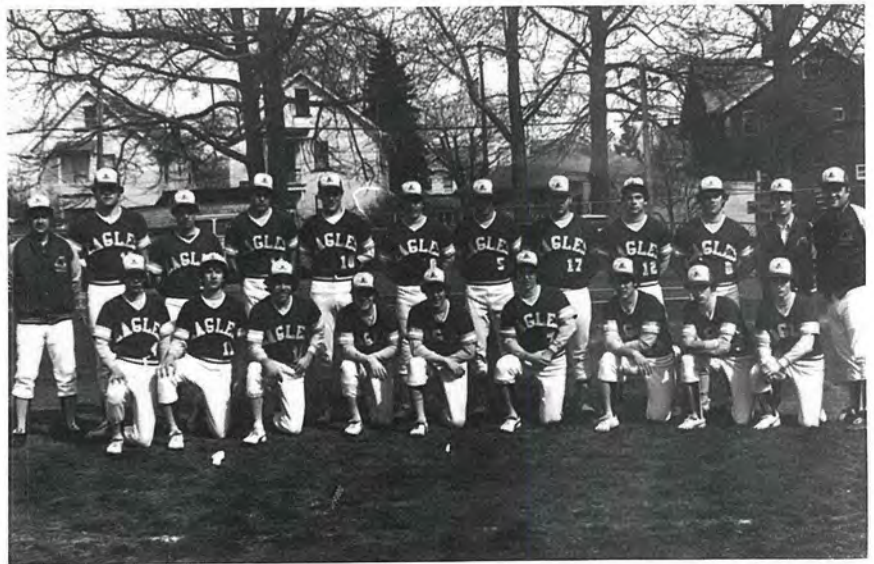
